Earlier in my parts career the life of the nurse was certainly very hard. The food was bad, the accommodation was bad and the liberty accorded to them was very deficient. As time went on these things have all improved and it is particularly observable in such large hospitals as Guy's Hespitals and the hespital for sick children to which I have been so closely associated for so many years that every possible care has been given to improve both the accommodation, the comforts, the well being and happiness of the nurses.

Because of the very hard work that these women have to perform their life of activity is necessarily short, and too early in their career they become too eld to be attractive generally. Put this stage there is unfortunately very little arranged for them, and one of the saddest experiences of ones life is to meet nurses who have been exceedingly aseful during their active life living upon very time deminutative income.

The Nursing profession is a wonderful profession, but in order to make it att factive to the young, highly educated girl of the present day it is of vital importance that they should have more accommodation better pay and that when they cease to be actively engaged in their pursuits they should have some form of pension or another which will ensure them from being pauperised.

In order to make the profession attractive to young ladies it is essential that when they enter as probationers they should not be expected to perform menial duties, but to confine their activities to looking after and mursing patients. It is also exceedingly important that they should be guaranteed some form of person pension so that when they reach old age and are no longer required by the public the ent of their life should be apent in compart.
