No curious strangers are encouraged round here. No hawkers, no circulars. Any vacuum-cleaner salesmen who get in are on the carpet. It's Canada's biggest camp for prisoners of war. Ten-thousand Germans - soldiers, sailors, airmen - have been shipped to the Dominion and put into cold storage for the duration. Fifteen-hundred are at this camp alone.

There are worse fates in wartime than being a prisoner. In many ways they'll be better off than if they'd remained in Germany. They do light work - or at least they work lightly - and in Canada they're sure of getting plenty to eat.

Guards keep a sharp watch. To the adventurous there's always a big temptation to escape in a huge country like Canada, where the chances of a long getaway are fairly good. One man who broke out of another camp was captured on the border of Mexico. Pilots, parachute troops, and U-boat crews make up this sizeable collection. They represent only half the Axis, so perhaps Greece will send a boat-load of Italians.
