There are almost 2000 men of the Canadian Forestry Corps now at work in various camps throughout the country. They arrived on Xmas Day and 6. have not been long getting down to the job of felling timber for the Ministry of Supply. There are about 200 men at this particular camp and they like all the others were specially picked lumbermen from all parts of Canada. The men in the pictures come from the Great Lakes and the towns of Fort Arthur and Fort William. Many of them served in the last war. Thet only receive about a third of the pay they received for the same work in peacetime occupation. Over 275 trees are felled a day and the mill turns out over 200 logs per day. The most modern methods are used and the equipment which is the most up to date was 8. all brought over with them.
