Roll 1. Wellesley bombers arrive back after raid on ASMARA. Upon their return they are immediately bombed up for another trip. This includes Roll 2.

Roll 3. In enemy material park. Here are collected somewhere behind the line various weapons used by the enemy. They were gathered together in a central park somewhere behind the lines. The guns included some of about 1850 vintage with no recoil. Also there are quite a number of tanks and transport.

Roll 4 Captured enemy material as above.

Roll 5. On the road to Cherin (pronounced cur-rin) the Italians blew up a bridge - or thought they did. There is very little damage done to the bridge and the Indians are quickly repairing it whilst a good substitute has been put into use across the river bed.

Roll 6. Supplies arriving on flat cars pushed along the track under cover of darkness. Supplies are carried up the mountain occupied by a Scottish regiment.

Roll 7. On the mountainside the cookhouse receives the day's supplies and the breakfast is supplied. The Scotties still manage to get their porridge for breakfast.

Roll 8. Breakfast being dished out. Enemy shells landing at the bottom of the mountain. The grave of a casualty half way up the mountainside.

Roll 9. The O.P. on Cameron's Ridge. Long shot of roadlock over which we must go to reach Cherin. Long shot of Cherin. Shelling enemy O.P. on mountain peak called Sandchil.

Roll 10. Long shot of landslide caused by the Italians on the road to Cherin in an effort to impede out progress. Stretcher bearers bringing down a casualty.

Rolls 11/12 Two shots of 25 pounder guns in action. Indians with three inch mortar guns. Hindus Sikhs and Musselmen advance through native village.

The country over which we are now fighting the Italians is considerably different from that of the Western Desert. In Eritrea the mountainous country gives the Italians a wonderful advantage over advancing troops. It seems impossible to surround the place.
