So that is how the story of Alice's very strange adventures was put on a gramophone record. From the studio the original "Wax," as it's called, was sent to the factory, where several impressions were taken.

The last operation is to fix the label on to each one. Transferred to Recordland "Alice" will help to pay for the Great Ormond Street building. Lewis Carrol, the Oxford professor of mathematice whose love of children impelled him to write the book, would have asked no greater reward than to know that a children's hospital is being helped by Alice In Wonderland.
