French Army make first moves in execution of Accord for the Cessation Story of Hostilities.

As agreed in the terms of the Convention signed at Acres, the French Army in Syria consisting mostly of Foreign Legion Sengalese and Algerians concentrate in various sectors, stacking arms and ammunition under guard.

They move northward to Tripoli, where the men gave the change of repatriation or remaining in Syria.

I went amongst the French in these Sections and found that the men and N.C.O'S in general were (or became after short conversation) quite friendly, but I was amazed and dismayed and disgusted at the fierce antipathetic attitude of the officers. They spoke as in rage were very unfriendly and at the same time arrogant. One when asked if he spoke English replied, "Yes I speak English - but I don't choose to speak it again" Another in French sneered "Allors - vous avez trouve les Allesmands ici - hien? Quel pretexte!"

It seems that from a propaganda point of view within Syria more harm than good has been done by our line that we were fighting to chase the Germans out of Syria, when not one in a thousand among the Syrian Army had seen or even heard of a German being any where near. Being realists the French would have reacted much more favourably to the statement the Syria was an essential outpost to our defence of the Nile and we could not afford to allow a prior move - which the French in Syria could not prevent effectively - by the enemy. I am mentioning this reaction I found among the Officer class because I feel that something from a propaganda point of view should be done about it immediately instead of allowing these men to return to France to sow further seeds of discord there.

I refrained from taking pictures where officers were around or wherever this feeling was manifested for obvious reasons. As I was filming Section of Armoured cars the men hurriedly fetched French Flag and put up picture of Marshal Petain.
