

CHICAGO ACCLAIMS WINDSORS ON TOUR

**They Are Cheered by Crowds
in Brief Stop-Over on Way
to Alberta Ranch**

DUCHESS'S EYE IS TREATED

**Doctor Attends Her While the
Duke Goes for a Ride to
Points of Interest**

CHICAGO, Sept. 27—The Duke and Duchess of Windsor were greeted by thousands of Chicagoans during a stay of two hours and forty-five minutes today. They arrived at 7:45 A. M. and left for St. Paul at 10:30. It was the Duke's first visit to Chicago since 1924, when he was the Prince of Wales.

When he stepped from one of his two special cars in the Union Station he wore a light gray double-breasted suit with white pin stripes, a gray V-neck sweater, red figured tie and suède shoes.

The Duke and Duchess are on their way to his ranch near Calgary, Alta.

The women in the crowd had not yet seen the Duchess and were disappointed when it was learned that she would not accompany the Duke on a brief automobile tour of the lake front. She was suffering from a small sty on her right eye and was attended in the train by Dr. Sanford Gifford of Chicago.

The Duke, flanked by Lewis Bernays, British Consul General in Chicago; Mr. Bernay's daughter-in-law, Mrs. Richard Bernays, and Mrs. Robert Ross, British Consul, moved through the station to the accompaniment of shouts of "Hey, Eddie!" from the throng of 3,000. The Duke smiled and waved his hand.

The party went first to the Board of Trade Building, where the Duke viewed the city from the observatory.

"This is a beautiful city and a beautiful skyline," he remarked.

The cars went to the outer drive, south to Soldier Field and then to the lake front near the Adler Planetarium, where the Duke alighted a moment. The cars then went to Buckingham Fountain, where the Duke again stepped out and chatted with William Lavelle, engineer at the fountain, on its operation.

When the Duke returned to the train he and the Duchess stepped out on the platform, where they were cheered.

The two posed smilingly for photographers.

The Duke and Duchess went to the Northwestern Station, where they boarded the Viking. They used the private car of Colonel Carl R. Gray Jr., vice president of the road. The couple again went to the platform and smiled at the crowd of about 1,000.
