These troops of the Polish Div. are situated on a hill. They are knee-deep in snow, and subject to all kinds of weather, at the moment some of the worst that Italy can produce. The men have been on the 8th Army front for some 2 weeks now, and some of them fought at Tobrak as a battalion with the 8th Army. Others have had fighting experience on the Russian Front, and these men find themselves in terrain similar to that in which they have previously fought. Since taking up their positions overlooking the Appenines and under enemy observation, these men have had to face some of the worst conditions that a soldier can possibly experience. Great quantities of snow have fallen in this parts of Italy, and mechanised vehicles are absolutely useless in this type of country. Accordingly, all supplies have to be carried by men or by mules. The Italian Mule Company is attached to the Polish Division, and is the only means of carrying rations to these troops in their forward positions. The Company work under supervision of a Polish Sergeant, and supply everything from water to ammunition. . The said of the Roll 1. L.S. The ground occupied by the Polish Division has remained almost the same for the past two months, owing to the heavy going of the terrain, and the difficult situated river bed. No easy matter when all movements must be done on foot, very little action is therefore taking place, except continual patrol, activities by the Ploes, and more so the enemy. Patrols are sent out by day, clad in snow clothes, giving good camouflage where extreme movement and distance has to be covered. At night patrol activity is much more intense by both sides.

Roll 6;
