BACKGROUND DOPE.

Recently men of the 7th. Indian Division of the TEX 14th.

Army fighting on the Arakan front were cut off by Jap forces but managed to fight their way out killing or seriously wounding some 4,500 Japs.

Preactically all supplies for this battle had to be dropped by air. This production shows how this was carried out. These aircraft were flying day and night throught the battle which lasted for twenty days and on no occasion were the fighting men lacking supplies. Other midget aircraft were used to evacuate seriously wounded men right from the battlefront and these were transferred at a forward air base to one of the supply aircraft on its return flight. Grant casualities including Japanese prisoners were evacuated in this manner. These aircraft were unarmed and had to fly in some of the most difficult conditions imaginable. Only one aircraft was lost during the operations. American orews assisted in the operations with the state of the R.A.F. bore the hunt of the tack. Men of the Air Supply Company packed the parachutes and supply containers and supplies ropped included rations of every nature, cigarettes, chocolate, ammunition, various items of equipment and even thirteen hundred bottles of beer. The midget Stinson aircraft, evacuating the wounded, had to fly under very difficult conditions and often had to land in the face of heavy enemy fire. They brought out wounded right under the Jap noses.
