They encountered a good deal of trouble from enemy mines and booby traps. Most of which consisted of trip wires attached to mines. The R.E's were sent for to clear the village of these obstacles. While they were at work we also came under mortar fire. There was a good deal of sniping on the part of enemy.

Roll 1.

Scenes of the German radio controlled midget demolition tank, known in these parts as the "Doodle Bug" the GI shown in the picture is showing the rear of the tank in the first scene. The two white stripes are the rear of the vehicle and are used as sights by the radio control operator. About one half mile of cable is supplied on a reel in the rear for controlling the tank. Shown.....in the rear are (on either side) two 24 volt batteries empty case shown with cable for attaching to motor which is just forward of the Battery Placement. Motor shown.....

Roll 2.

The compartment shown in the front of the vehicle contains when in operation 60 to 100 lbs of first class TNT. All of which is shaped to fit the oddly shaped nose of the vehicle. One block of the TNT is holed only for the detonator, which is fired by the radio operator. One of the vehicles in operation, one tread and one motor working. A LIL GI horseplay as one fearless radio rides the contraption. Watching GI's have a laugh (close up). (Unfortunately the control parts were not captured). Men are members of the Ordnance.

French families (refuged) come from cellar where they stayed during Naval, Air, and Artillery bombardment of city. They lived in debris cooked in ruins, washed, ate under terrific strain. Some where from Cherbourg, men, women, and children.

Roll 5.

More ruins, "Montebourg" sign at bombed Post Office. Also road signs.

First picturers of the burning of Montebourg, Normandy, N.W. France, on the Cherbourg Penninsula, which was captured by the 4th Inf. Division. Shots were taken at night as planes gutted buildings in the heart of the city. Shots of Infantry moving through city. The city had been bombed and shelled for days. Yanks had to take city twice, the second time for deaps on road to Valganes and Cherbourg.

It is nearer to the line than ever a general hospital has been before. The first patients were omitted today 20.6.44 and the majority of Sisters are occupied in getting the hospital erected and fitted out rather than nursing (for the present at least). The usual grey uniform is laid aside in favour of khaki battledress.
