With an excellent fighting record in the Western Desert and in Italy, the Greek Brigade has returned to Greece to form the nucleus of the new Greek National Army, Late one evening they disembarked on their native seil along with elements for the Greek Air Force, their exile was over.

Next day they marched through the streets of Athens. It was very moving, many people in the huge crowds looked expectantly haping to see some relative from whom they had not heard in several years; some were lucky but others lookil in vain. Often someone in the crowd would dash out to great a man whom they recognised.

The salute was taken by the chiefs of the British and Greek armies in Greece and the Greek Premier, to whom the General in charge of the force reported. The Greek army was home again.

These rolls are all of similar content, viz miscellaneous aerial pictures of Salonika and so are self explanatory.

The Wellington trip was laid on to watch the roads of northern Greece to try and catch any Germans who were still evacuating. We flew up the coast to Salonika but inland from there was full cloud up to ten or twelve thousand feet so the main story of the "fleeing Hun" etë was impossible. I therefore shot the enclosed Salonika pictures as being very useful for my next story which will follow in a few days. Is the exact date is uncertain these pictures are being forwarded first in ease they may be of use with other material which you may receive.

NOTES. As the main story had gone and as my film stock is getting

low (consignments now on their way should have reachedItaly in my absence) I used some of the rolls which were part of the consignment sent last year to Italy and which got wet. I think the spools were bent as well; for the first time in months and with a freshly ciled camera I had a lot or jamming at the ends of the rolls. Hence rell two is broken as noted on the can label. Thus any technical trouble I know about now - it was just a case of trying to save stock,

Although it is at least five days that British troops have been reported in Salonika, until today all they amounted to was a handful of Navy personnel from a Motor Launch, a small group of S.B.S. (half a dozen maintaining a radio set), and odd agents that have come down from the mountains now that the Germans have left the City. This morning the first large body came up in Motor Launches and unloaded onto a small jetty. Previously E.L.A.S. (the Greek Resistance Movement) who at the moment are still running the town, held a large parade in token of its liberation.
