When the Atlantic Hetel at Hamburg was the headquerters of the 53rd Weish they set about proving that the pen is mightier than the sword and started a newspaper. A Dutchman who was divisional liaison officer and a lieutenant hailing from Sheffield were joint editors. What they put in was translated into five languages, French, Dutch, Polish Italian, German.

Over at the Hamburger Anzeiger efficem the Victory Herald was printed. It was very much a utility newspaper - just one side of a foolscap sheet - but it met the needs of people who hadn't seen a non-German paper for years. When proofs were corrected, printing began. Probably no newspaper has ever been printed in so many languages.

and distribution began. After the first severe bombing

of Hamburg thousands of foreign workers - slave labour 
were brought to the city to clear up the mess and keep

the port going. The Victory Herald was intended for

them. It was a big success, right from the first number.

It was in five languages. It should have been six - one for folks that can't read.
