## NO SOFT PRACE FOR GERMANY

No longer in the subordinate role of observer but as chief representative of the British Commonwealth Mr. Attlee returned to the Berlin Confernece. His wife and daughters greeted Mr. and Mrs. Bevin at the RAF aerodrome from which the Prime Minister and Foreign Sey. took off. The Conference had neared its final stages before the election. Little more was now required than mum for all three parties to the draft announcement.

Meanwhile Pres. Truman and Gen. Eisenhower, with a U.S. Airborne Division in attendanse, decorated British and Dominion commanders at Frankfort. Upon General Crerar, the Canadian C.-in-C., the President conferred the American Distinguished Service Medal.

Air Marshal Coningham received the same honour and after him, Air Marshal Robb and General De Guingand. When the honours had been conferred the Airborne Division marched past providing the unusual sight of the flags of both countries being carried together.

Then at Potsdam the three powers held their final sessions. They made it clear that on the issue of dis-armament no loop-holes will be left to Germany. The lessons of what happened last time have been completely learned. There is to be a Council of Foreign Ministers, sitting in London, to draft the preliminary peace treaties. On main issues the Great Powers continue in harmony.

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
