Address by Brigadier General C. M. Thiele, Commandant, at the Opening of U. S. Army University, Shrivenham, England, 1 August 1945.

General Lee, General Thompson, distinguished guests, members of the Staff and Faculty, and students. Today marks the birth of the U.S. Fray University, Shrivenham, England, and I wish to officially welcome you to the institution.

This university is unique. While the Army has always engaged in educational activities, they have been principally for the purpose of instructing in the military art and science. The object of this University is to instruct in the higher levels of education normally reserved for our universities and colleges, both in the graduate and undergraduate fields.

To accomplish this end we have assembled a faculty of 214 members from 100 different universities and colleges, representing practically every state in the Union. These gentlemen are not just educators, but are from the top levels; and I think I may safely say that few institutions are botter fitted than we are to instruct in the 250 courses we offer. 132 of our faculty have been taken directly from our civilian institutions and I cannot speak too highly of the cooperation given us by the executives of those institutions in releasing such key personnel. The other 82 members have been drawn from the military, both enlisted and commissioned. They are, however, ally professors in disguise.

Not anly have we planned carefully for the instruction of our students. but we have planned equally carefully for their welfare and recreation. We have assembled selected instructors in practically every sport, and the army has furnished us with the best of athletic equipment. The Red Cross has established two excellent clubs and our Special Service Division is prepared to assist the student in occupying his spare time

with tours o? England, movies, plays and many other forms of recreation and amusement.

I til ink it most fitting that at this time I pay tribute to those who, in the short space of two months, have made it possible for us to open on this duie. To the officers and men of our station complement who have organized and prepared Shrivenham Barracks for the housing, the feeding and the wall-being of all our personnel. To our faculty who, in the shorter space of two weeks, have organized and prepared 250 courses for the instruction of 3,616 students. And last but not least, to our Britis. Allies who have placed this magnificent plant at our dispesal and who have cooperated so whole heartedly in putting at our dispesal personnel and facilities we could not provide from our own resources.

And now just a word as man to man with our students. The Army is giving you foppertunities have before offered to members of our Armed Forces. Take full advantage of them, but do not abuse them. While you are here, you will be required to perform no military duties; your status will be that of a student and we wish to create the same atmosphere as exists on any of our university campused. There will be no military formations excepting reveile, and that we are having in order to get you out of bed.

There are certain things, however, which I insist upon being observed. One is courtesy. There is nothing strange about that because courtesy is found both in the Army and out of the Army. We have a special form of courtesy in the Army which is peculiar to us as soldiers, and that I wish you to corupatously coverve and practice.

Another matter which I desire to be observed is the matter of correct dress. In the free and easy atmosphere of a university there is an inclination to be equally free and easy in one's dress; however, we

wear a uniform and there is a prescribed manner in which that uniform must be worn. I therefore request that you all pay particular attention + your appearance and that when you appear outside of your quarters, and are not ongaged in sports, that you appear in the prescribed uniform worn as it should be.

And once again, welcome to Shrivenham.
