THE BIG SWITCH.

Tackling the biggest conversion since Dunkirk, British industry has both feet planted on the road back. Six years of munition making are over; the nation's manpower turns over to production for peace. 45,000 factories receiving Board of Trade orders to revert to peace-time production, set their Works' Committeesplanning the biggest change-over of a lifetime. The now useless war machinery must in many cases be uprooted. A gigantic task in itself this part of the change-over involve immediate cataloguing of hundreds of thousands of machines. Whatever cannot be used on the spot must be taken out, sometimes for transfer to other factories.

Factory Drawing Offices are hard at it turning out blueprints of the necessary new machines and the new tools. Their manufacture, up and down the country, is rapidly proceeding. Much of the old machinery, useless for peace, is ruthlessly turned to scrap to provide the rawmaterial of the new.
