- 2. Athens—A United Nations Commission investigates the Greek crisis a Greece racked by economic and political chaos. At the Acropole Palace Hotel, witnesses of four countries are here to testify. Albania's Colonel Kerenchi, Koulishev of Bulgaria, Alexander Kyryou of Greece, Yugoşlavia's Djerdja. As the inquiry moves ahead, the United Nations Commission, with U.S. and Russian delegates present, digs beneath the surface of the Greek complaints. Greece, the only Balkan country on which Russia's iron curtain has not descended, charges that Russia's allies are carrying on a war of nerves against her. And Greece is the key to the Dardanelles, which Russia wants.
