FLOODS WORST FOR 53 YEARS.

Few people now living can remember such a catastrophe as the all-enveloping waters have inflicted upon the great area in the triangle whose points are the Wash, Bristol Channel and Thames Valley. When the River Lea burst its banks more than a million people in East experienced London actually suffered from a shortage of water, surely the last straw in the long tale of distress suffered during this appalling winter. Lea Bridge waterworks was put out of action when the floods contaminated the filter beds. In this emergency the Metropolitan Water Board supplied householders from its mobile tanks. Perhaps for a fortnight there will be only enough for drinking and cooking. Tanks were obtained from as far PTOLOT afield as Yorkshire.

(GV) Suburban railways in this area were brought to a standstill. Even telephone services broke down.

(After Air) Thousands of people who believed their houses to be well clear of the flood limit sadly discovered their mistake. Bungalow dwellers, without upstairs room for themselves or furniture, were hard hit indeed. They had to leave their homes under feet of water and get away when rescue was improvised.

the plight of the Fen country as critical. The people in this area feared overwhelming disaster at every high tide. At one period the water nearly reached the highest recorded level, as far back as eighteen twenty three.

The ice jammed the garage door, and my car is still there. I spent the day in waders, taking pictures. The water rose all the time. My furniture is pretty well ruined. When we thought we were completely marooned my wife and I were rescued by a Churchill tank that evening.
