From his South Polar camp at the Bay of Whales reports sensational Antarctic discoveries have been brought by Admiral Byrd. Fully equipped with all exploration necessities, from the husky dogs to modern airplanes Byrd discovered large icy-free lakes in the heart of the Polar continent. Explanation of this baffling discovery will have to wait for a later expedition. Byrd confirms Captain Scott's view that the Antarctic is enormously rich in minerals.
