INTERVIEW CAPTAIN MARPLES.

LV Marples surrounded by workmen.

Workman speaks: "There is a feeling amongst the men if they have their basic wage raise they will agree with payment by results."

Marples speaks, Marples answers.

"What I want, what the whole nation wants, is a payments by results scheme. This is divided into two parts. Personally ~~like~~ a man will get paid by the time he puts in on the job; in addition, I repeat that, in addition he will get an output bonus for all output produced above a certain level. <sup>Given</sup> They get the best of both sides."

SV Marples. "Of course, you mustn't confuse piecework by payment by results, because on piecework a man's wage depends entirely on the output he produces, and I don't want that. I want payment by results where he gets the two elements. Firstly his time rate, and secondly his output bonus." (workman speaks) " 'course that's alright. You can talk like that there, but it's the ~~kind~~ kind of material you have to use after prescribed payment by result. With material used today it's so awkward, and when you start the building of today when they start they start just the same as it was 'undred years ago they start..... "

CU Marples. "Yes, but the real answer to the nation's production problems is this - both sides have got to get together, and for heaven's sake be reasonable with each other. And I think you'll agree that's the answer to most of the problems." (men say yes)

FCU Marples. "Yes, but the real answer to the nation's production problems today - all industries as well as the Building Industry is for both sides, workmen, employers, management, to get together with a reasonable attitude. If they do that the problems will be solved" (workman speaks, out of picture)

"We're mainly concerned with the Building Industry." (Marples) "It applies to the Building Industry too - they get together, discuss the thing man to man, there wont be any trouble, I'm certain." (workman out of picture)

"Alright then, while the management agrees to discuss it the men will always listen, will always listen." (pan to workman) "and a lot of things they'll agree with. But they'll never turn nothing down." (Marples says - "I'll always discuss it with you."

CU workman. "As long as the men get a rise in their basic wage they'll always talk on payment by results. I think you cant wish for anything fairer than that. But they must have their basic wage raise first."
