## BRITAIN AND FRANCE GIVE LEAD TO EUROPE.

Home from the Paris Conference Ernest Bevin was by no means downcast over the usual Russian refusal to co-operate with the West. He announced the Angle-Brench decision to call a 24-nation conference. In Paris all efforts failed to induce the Soviet to fall into line over the Marshall plan to prime the pump of Europe with dollars. Fearing increased American influence Molotov raised every possible objection and finally left the British and French Foreign Ministers to carry on by themselves. By plane Molotov returned to Moscow after one more abortive conference. General de Gaulle, acclaimed at Lille four days before Bevin's return, called on France to resume her role as a leader in Europe, warned her against subservience to either Russia or America. Even as he spoke French coal mines were idle, on strike. And as U.S. aid will not be forthcoming to a strike-ridden Europem politically at sixes and sevens France may be expected to get down to work.
