Scy SV The problem which confronts us is this.

Our exports look like falling short of our imports during the next twelve months by about £450 millions. The Covernment are quite clear that they should not impose import cuts which would require a drastic reduction in our standard of living until it is absolutely certain that this is the only course open to us. The first duty of the Government to our own people, and to the world, is to keep Britain in full production, and full employment, in good health and good heart.

Coll What then can be done?

Production is now universally recognised as national duty No. 1. The Government have placed it firmly in that position by a sustained campaign. But while an immediate increase in our output of goods would do much to simplify our balance of payments problem. increased British effort alone could not solve it. The gap is far too wide to be closed by any increase in production and exports that can be expected in the early future. Increased production and exports are the long term solution, but they cannot provide a short term answer. They cannot enable us to pay our way in time. SV FCd The only immediate remedy lies in devising some means whereby billions of dollars worth of American production can be transferred across the Atlantic without the necessity of immediate payment in the form of an

equal and opposite flow of European goods.

But that does not affect the urgent duty of every one of us to do everything possible to increase our production of goods, so that we neither have to live on tick nor cut down our standard of life.

In the long run, it's up to us and nobody else.
