Estonia, main the scheme to bring Displaced Persons into the country. They are going into another of our harassed basic industries, Cotton. The Lancashire mills provided our second largest export before the war. The girls from the Baltic will help production back to the pre-war level. It is provided to the fourteen and the brickfields have gone some of the min-thousand.
