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Delhi has been a scene of communal risting for the last one week. During this period more than 1000 persons were killed; some of the streets with Muslim domination were either burnt or looted. Refugees from West Punjab can be held resposible for these riots, they after their arrival started telling their tales of misery which axis excited Hindu population of Delhi and the communal riots took place.

Mr. Gandhi, who after his miracle in Calcutta, was on his way to Punjab, but when he heard about the trouble in Delhi, he decided to stay in Delhi. As a result of these riots, most of the Muslim population of Delhi is taking protection in the refugee camps. Mr. Gandhi visited these camps and assured Muslims that he would either restore peace in Delhi or die.

As a result of Mr. Gandhi's assurance, some of the Muslim refugees have gone back to their houses but so far the number is very small.

Reel.I. (Sinclair 200')

(Note:- In the first 125 feet in this reel there are shots of Muslims evecuation by air which has been arranged by the Pakistan Government. The Pakistan Government chartered 20 planes from different British air companies and these planes are evecuating Muslims from Delhi to Karachi.)

Shots of passengers arriving and getting in the plane. Shot of a jeep with trailer bringing luggage. Shot of a plane taking off. Another shot of passengers arriving. Shot of luggage being kept in a BOAC dakota.

Shot of a deserted street in PAHAR GANJ which was the worst affected area during the recent communal riots in Delhi. Pahar Ganj was mostly populated by Muslims who provided a good deal of resistance by means of unauthorised arms. There was pitched battle between the army and the Muslims for full one night and quite a number of persons were killed.

Reel.2. (Sinclair 200 Ft.)

Shot of Mr. Gandhi accompanied by Miss Manu Gandhi (Grand daughter), Mrs. Abha Gandhi (Wife of grandson), Dr. Sushila Nayar and others leaving Birla House New Delhi for a visit to the Muslim refugee camps.

Shots of thousands of Muslim refugees inside the old fort, New Delhi. Regugees being asked to sit down. Long shot of refugees with Mr. Gandhi's car on the left. Shots of crowd. M.L.S. Diwan Chaman Lal, who accompanied Mr. Gandhi speaking for Mr. Gandhi. Mr. Gandhi has very low voice and as there were no facilties of loud speakers, Mr. Lal was asked to repeat the words of Mr. Gandhi. Shot of Gandhi's car coming out of the old fort.

Shots of refugees waiting in que to obtain water. Shot of a refugee receiving water. Further shot of refugees in que waiting for their turn to receive water for which the supply was quited limited in the camp.

The communal riots in Delhi have turned hundreds of thousands Muslims into refugees and due to the scarcity of food they can not be fed properly. The Pakistan Government arranged to send some cooked food for all these refugees but it was so insufficient that only lucky refugees received \(\frac{1}{2}\) of a chapati. (Chapati: round bread made of wheat weighs from 2 to 4 ounces.) It was terrible scene to watch the distribution of bread which was earried on by an Indian army officer. Quite a number of refugees who could not get any thing to eat for the past 48 hours were left over. (After the visit of Mr. Gaudhi to these eamps, the Government of India has taken the charge of these camps and the Government would be arranging for the food.)

The food was insufficient and Military help was seeked for an equitable distribution. There were young and old, many were hungry for the past 48 hours but only few lucky ones were able to receive hardly one ounce of bread. Shots of an army officer giving away pieces of bread. Various shots of refugees raising their hands to receive feed. Shots of refugees pushing each other to enable them to receive a piece of bread. Close up shots of men and woman.

Reel.3. (Sinclair- 200 Ft.)

Long shot of the Muslim refugees in Delhi who are staying in the open. Most of them have lost fortunes but some were lucky to bring their cattle. Another pan shot of the refugee camp which accomodated 20,000 refugees.)

Besides the food, there was the scarcity of water as well. Shot of a group of refugees jumping over each other for water which is was obtained from a well at distance of one mile from the camp.

Shot of Mr. Gandhi coming out of his car. Mr. Gandhi going round the refugee camp. Further shots. Shots of refugees magina anxiously looking towards Gandhi. Further shots. Shots of refugees running to see Gandhi. Mr. Gandhi coming up the steps where he visited another refugee centre. Long Shot of Mr. Gandhi coming out from a refugee centre. During the recent riots quite a number of unauthorised arms were used against Military and after imposing curfew, the Military started to check all the **Eshikaxkraffix* mobile traffic. Even the car of the Governer General was theroughly searched. Shot of an Indian sepoy checking motor cars in the Connaght Place, New Delhi. (2 shots) (For continuity please see Eymo reel No. 4.)

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Shots of a number of refugees with buckets waiting in que for water.
After visits of Mr. Gandhi to various refugee centres and assurances
by Mr. Gandhi, some of the refugees decided to go back to their
houses but most of them agreed to go to other refugee camps where
the Indian Government had arranged to provide food.

Shot of a number of refugees with their belongings on their heads ready to leave the camp eith for their house or a new refuge centre.

EYMO REEL. I.

Quite a large number of Muslims were killed during the communal riots in Delhi. There was a complete breakdown of various services and the dead bodies remained in streets. Shot of a dead body on the Chelmsford Road. It was stinking and passersby had to cover their noses. Another shot of a number of dead bodies in a New Delhi street.

Long shots of Muslim refugees in a refugee sentre. They numbered more than 20,000. In the begining the trouble started between Hindus and Muslims but afterwards to control the situation, the Military took over the charge of the city. At places there were pitched battles between the Muslims and Military. Most of the Muslims, in order to save their lives left their homes and went to refugee camps where they were protected by the Military.

EYMO REEL. 2.

Shot of a dead body by the road side. The body was half burnt. Shots of Pahar Ganj which was a mojor Muslim locality but was deserted in one night. The shops were looted or put on fire, quite a number of persons were stabled and some of those who resisted with the Military were killed during in action.

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EYMO REEL.3.

Scenes of dead bodies in streets of Pahar Ganj. Shot of a number of dead persons who were put on fire after killing them.

Further scenses of dead bodies in a narrow street of Pahar Ganj. Street littered with dead bodies. Close ups. Closeup of a half burnt dead body of a shild. Shot of 2 burnt out ears.

Strict currew was imposed in Delhi and New Delhi arter these happenings. An Indian sepoy checking currew passes before permitting people to cross the currew area.

Each and every car was checked and even the Governer General's car was thoroughy searched before it could be permitted to leave. The car was being thoroughly searched but I could never expect Lord Mountbatten in it. IXMME When the car moved I was surprised to notice Lord and Lady Mountbatten seated in it.)

Shots of Lord and Lady Mountbatten speaking to a Muslim City Father of Delha. The City Father requested Lord Mountbatten to arrange for the food of Muslim refugees, Lord Mountbatten promised to look into the matter.)
