£10,000 STOLEN **GOODS FOUND IN** VILLAGE BARN

A SCOTLAND YARD flying squad swooping on the little village of Cuddesdon, a few miles from Oxford, found in a barn about £10,000 worth of stolen furniture belonging to the Ministry of Supply Supply.

Tables, chairs and other furniture of the type used in Service canteens were piled almost to the ceiling.

There was evidence that a large trade had been

a large trade had been going on in renovating the furniture.

It is believed that furniture had been removed by night in lorries from many parts of the country.

The raid followed inquiries in London.

YARD MADE £10,000 HAUL IN RAID

ON BARN

CUDDESDON. Wednesday. TOLEN furniture other property worth £10,000 has been found by a Scotland Yard flying squad which raided an old barn in this Oxfordshire village.

Owned by the Ministry of Supply, the goods consisted of tables, chairs and other articles of the type used in Naafi and Service canteens.

Nobody was more surprised at

the discovery than the villagers.
Almost daily, lorries stacked with furniture have been arriving quite openly at the barn in the centre of the village and the residents saw

nothing wrong about it.
Nor did the 50 clergymen who pass daily on the way to the theological college, Cuddesdon's main building.

Bought blankets

a time, a whisper went that surplus Government stor were being sold, and some villagers went along to inspect the goods and even bought blankets at 10s. or 7s. 6d.

Fifteen-year-old Dorothy Turner told me: "I work at the vicarage and often saw the lorries arriving at the barn. Sometimes when passed, I saw a man in the yard with a spray, and the furniture looked shiny and new, as if it had been renovated."

"The firm"

Mrs. Mary Smith, who owns a petrol pump in the village, said: "We think the furniture was advertised for sale because several times strangers came here to in-quire where 'the firm' was.

"We heard that weights and scales and typewriters as well as furniture were advertised."

The flying squad found goods piled almost to the roof in the barn and others stacked in the yard. ee men, I understand, have

questioned.
