

BUCKINGHAM PALACE, Oct. 21.

The King, accompanied by the Queen and the Princess Elizabeth, went in procession to the Palace of Westminster to-day to open the Session of Parliament.

The Royal Procession was formed in the following order:

THE IRISH STATE COACH
(Four Grey Horses).

HIS MAJESTY THE KING,
HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN.

THE GLASS COACH
(Two Grey Horses).

HER ROYAL HIGHNESS
THE PRINCESS ELIZABETH.

The Hon. Mrs. Andrew Elphinstone
(Lady in Waiting).

FIRST CARRIAGE (State Landau with two Bay Horses): The Dowager Duchess of Northumberland (Mistress of the Robes); the Countess Spencer (Lady in Waiting); the Duke of Beaufort (Master of the Horse); Air Cmdr. the Duke of Hamilton and Brandon (Lord Steward).

SECOND CARRIAGE (State Landau with two Bay Horses): The Lady Hyde (Woman of the Bedchamber); Field-Marshal the Lord Birdwood (Gold Stick in Waiting); Adml. Sir Martin Dunbar-Nasmith, V.C. (Vice-Admiral of the United Kingdom); the Earl of Eldon (Lord in Waiting).

THIRD CARRIAGE (State Landau with two Bay Horses): Lt.-Col. the Earl of Airlie (Lord Chamberlain to the Queen); the Rt. Hon. Sir Alan Lascelles (Private Secretary to the King); Sir Ulick Alexander (Keeper of the Privy Purse); Col. Henry Abel Smith, Royal Horse Guards (Silver Stick in Waiting).

FOURTH CARRIAGE (State Landau with two Bay Horses): Mr. Arthur Pearson, M.P. (Treasurer of the Household); Mr. Frank Collindridge, M.P. (Comptroller of the Household); Col. Sir Alexander Stanier, Bt., Commanding Welsh Guards (Field Officer in Brigade Waiting); Lt.-Cmdr. Peter Ashmore, R.N. (Equerry in Waiting).

Their Majesties and her Royal Highness were conducted to their carriages by the Master of the Horse and left the Palace at 10.40 o'clock, escorted by a Sovereign's escort of the Household Cavalry with Standard, under the command of Major R. J. Hardy, The Life Guards.

The King's Guard of the 2nd Bn., Coldstream Guards, with the King's Colour and the band of the regiment, under the command of Major J. A. Pelly, was mounted in the quadrangle of the Palace and received their Majesties with a Royal salute.

The route of the procession was lined by the Brigade of Guards.

A guard of honour of the 1st Bn., Grenadier Guards, with the King's Colour and the band of the regiment, under the command of Major P. C. Britten, was mounted at the Palace of Westminster, and a dismounted party of non-commissioned officers and men of the Household Cavalry was stationed at Victoria Tower, House of Lords, under the command of Lt. the Lord Burghersh, Royal Horse Guards.

A salute of 41 guns was fired in St. James's Park by the Riding Troop, Royal Horse Artillery, under the command of Capt. W. J. W. Froud, on the arrival of his Majesty at the Houses of Parliament.

Lt.-Col. Sir Terence Nugent (Comptroller, Lord Chamberlain's Office) conveyed the Imperial State Crown to the House of Lords in one of the King's Carriages, escorted by a detachment of the Household Cavalry.

Lt.-Col. Henry de Satgé and Rear-Adml. Sir Arthur Bromley were in attendance as Gentlemen Ushers.

His Majesty's Body Guard of the Honourable Corps of Gentlemen at Arms, under the command of Brig.-Gen. Harvey Kearsley (the Lieutenant), was on duty in the Prince's Chamber. Brig.-Gen. Basil Buckley (the Standard Bearer), Lt.-Col. Valentine Vivian (the Clerk of the Cheque and Adjutant) and Col. Henry Pryce-Jones (the Harbinger) were present on duty with the Corps.

The King's Body Guard of the Yeomen of the Guard was on duty at the House of Lords, under the command of Brig.-Gen. Robert McCalmont (the Lieutenant). Lt.-Col. Sir Edward Frederick, Bt. (the Ensign), Maj. the Hon. Edric Weld-Forester (the Clerk of the Cheque and Adjutant) and Lt.-Col. Ralph Bingham (Exon) were also on duty.
