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STATE CONTINGENTS IN NEW DELHI

Preparations For Folk Dance Festival

BY A STAFF REPORTER Beating drums, tribal chants and the wail of strange instruments were heard in New Delhi on Thursday as State contingents camping in Talkatora Gardens, rehearsed for the folk dance festival at the National Stadium on January 27

Sente of the dancers had travelled by train for the first time to bring the most remote tribal dances to Delhi for the Republic Day celebra-tions.

Each contingent had a unique appeal with completely individual forms of dress, styles of dancing and musical accompaniments. Items ranged from the savage rhythmic war-dance of the Mao Nagas of Manipur to the intricate musical pattern-dancing of the Saurashtra contingent.

In complete contrast were the low, stately movements of the addi dancers from Himachal Praesh with their elaborate headresses and white woollen gowns. Horned Roya drummers from prissa circled round their chanting romen, to be followed by another nixed, but more sophisticated group rom Bombay doing the Ras dance.

No less fascinating were dances rom Punjab, West Bengal, Bihar, EPSU, Rajasthan and Assam—alogether a spectacular and colourful icture of lesser-known aspects of adia's variegated culture.

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
