ALDRICH, NEW AMBASSADOR

SV Aldrich and other. "It is a great privilege to introduce to you Mr. Aldrich, the new American Ambassador to the Ct. of St. James."

CU Aldrich: "... ~~feelings of real emotion~~. It is with feelings of real emotion that I return as my country's official representative to a land I have known long and loved, and to a people for whom I have the warmest feelings of friendship and admiration.

To work closely with Britons again - particularly at the beginning of this new Elizabethan Age with its spirit of hope and determination - is a privilege I value highly.

I have watched with grave concern reports of the tragic floods here. You may be assured that my fellow-Americans are deeply grieved and affected by the loss of life and the tremendous devastation. Our heartfelt sympathy goes out to you. During the recent war I learned to know the British people even more intimately than I did during my many previous visits here. I saw at first hand the magnificent courage, fortitude and ingenuity with which they withstood and repelled the savage attacks made upon them. The knowledge of and respect for the British spirit and character which I have gained during the years gives me a feeling of complete confidence that our two countries, in cooperation with each other and with other freedom-loving nations, will be able to solve the many problems which face them today. I am convinced that close and enduring Anglo-American friendship is essential to the preservation of the free world."
