The posies carried were originally sweeten to ~~the~~ the odour of the poor. Westminster Abbey, the usual ~~church for the distribution, is closed for preparing the~~ coronation. 27 old men and the same number of women -

45 one ~~man~~ for each year of the Queen's life - all received £2 10/-, a coronation-year ~~man~~ 5-shilling piece, a clothing allowance and specially minted coins to the value of 27-pence. Anyone can apply for Maundy Money; those chosen must be old and have seen better days.
