A telephonic marker buoy showed the position of the sunken Turkish Submarine Duplupinar. She collided at two in the morning with the Naboland, a Swedish cargo boat. A salvage vessel began work almost as soon as it was light. The sub lay in 200-feet of water, divers in heaviest possible suits proved unable to help at that depth. 40 men were alive in the compartment connected by telephone with the buoy, but the air was rapidly becoming unfit to breathe. The divers signalled it was hopeless, bad news for the five survivors in hospital, They were on ~~the~~ <sup>deck</sup> ~~surface~~ when the sub collided. After 30 hours fruitless salvage effort the telephone went silent the 40 men had died. In all 81 perished in this disaster.
