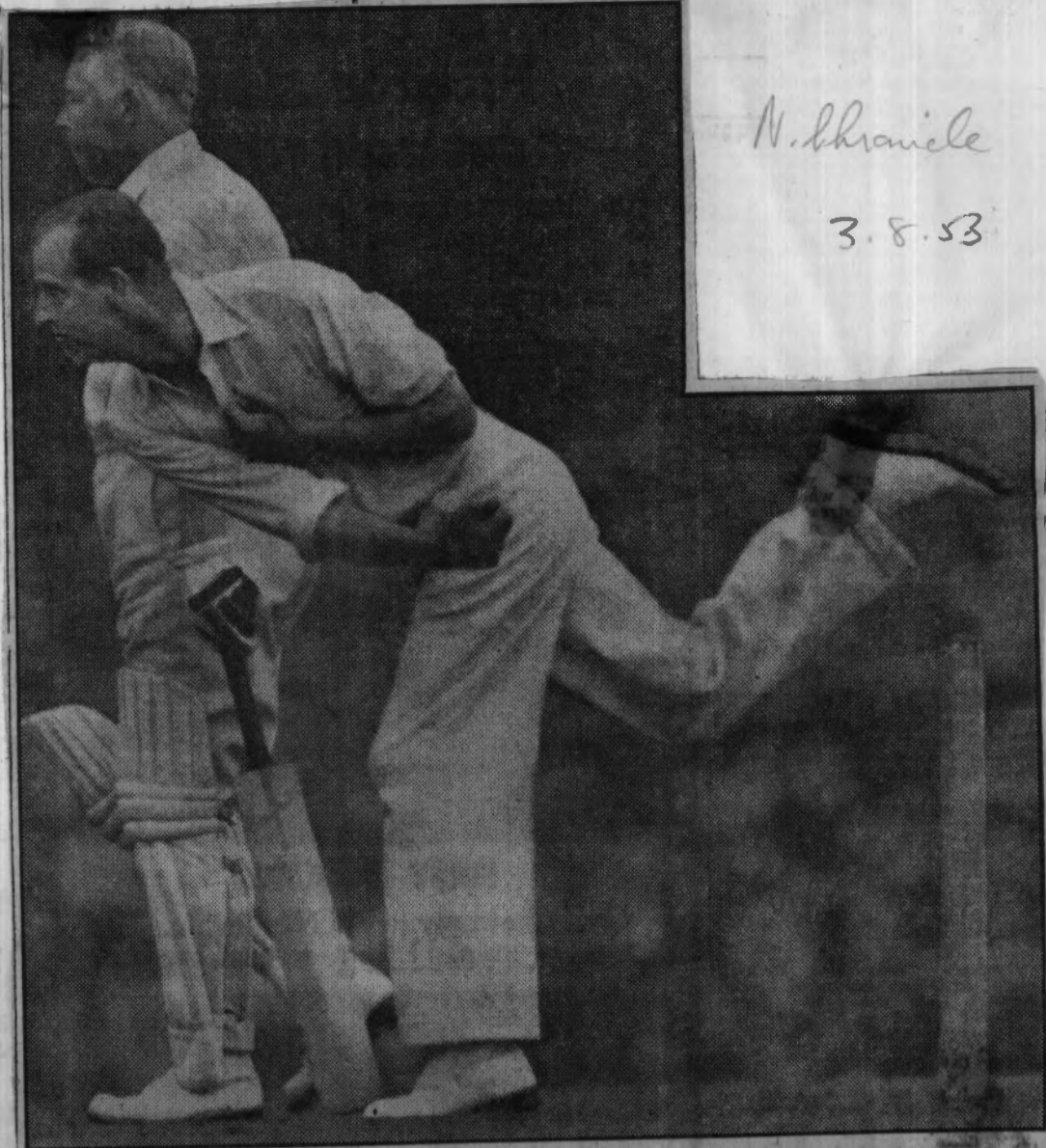

THE EARL MARSHAL OUT FOR FOUR

NEWS CHRONICLE REPORTS

DUKE bowled Duke on the lovely cricket ground at Arundel Castle yesterday, and the cheers of 30,000 spectators echoed from medieval battlements. For the Duke of Norfolk, out for 4, walked down the pitch, bat under arm, to shake the spin-bowling hand of the Duke of Edinburgh.

The two dukes, both wearing the red, black and yellow caps of I Zingari, led teams of cricket giants, past and present—including four England captains and W. J. Edrich.

The combat brought in nearly £2,400 for the National Playing Fields Association, of which the Duke of Edinburgh is president.

The crowds who had blocked the roads into Arundel for miles around did not care if it was vintage or small beer cricket. They jostled the dukes and they yelled encouragement when the Earl Marshal put himself on to bowl against his royal rival.

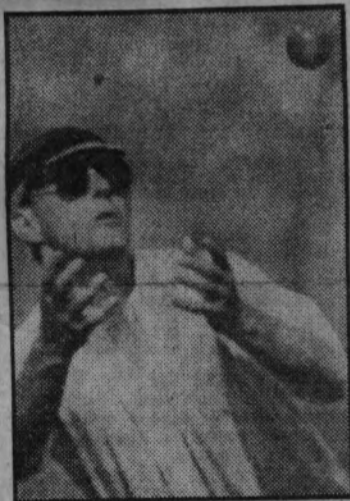
Bails trembled

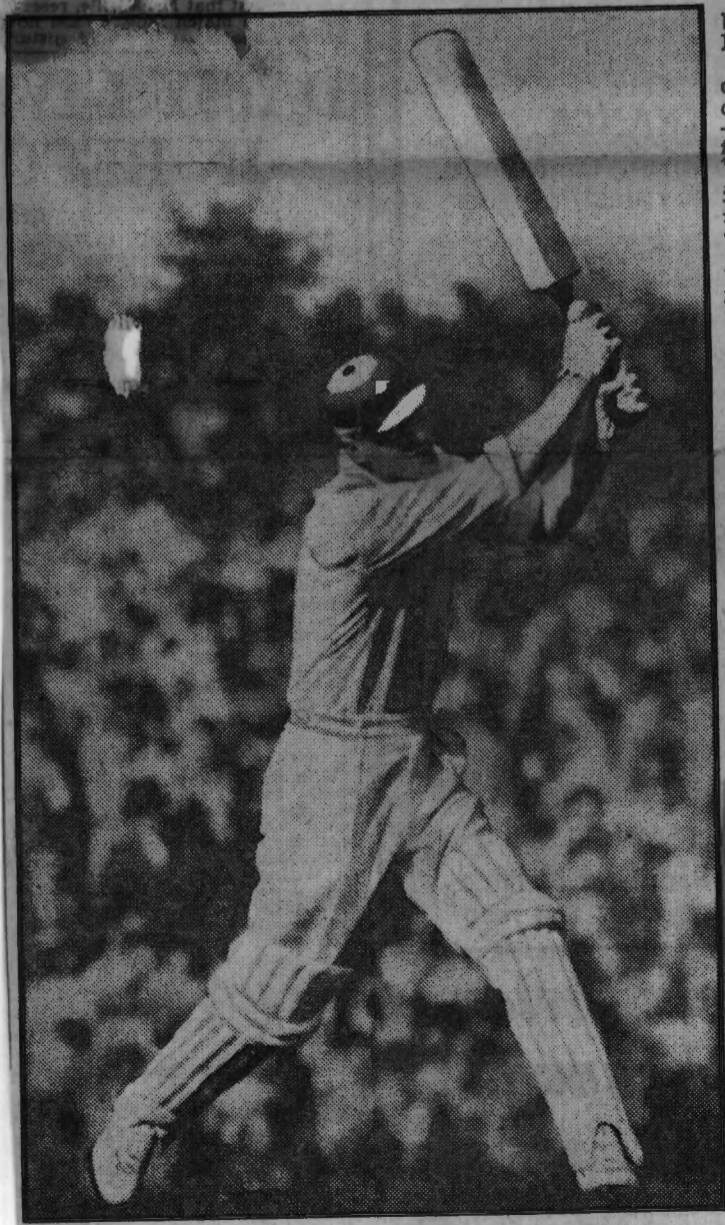
The Duke of Norfolk's winning side had declared at 204 for 6.
