A Convair B.36 came down in the Atlantic, and engines ablaze, 450 miles West of Ireland. U.S. air stations in Scotland and elsewhere dispatched planes to search the area. Twenty R.A.F. aircraft joined in. Four survivors were picked up and the bodies of five dead, but fourteen of the twenty-three aboard the Rescue craft dead functions of a lifeboat to one survivor in a rubber dinghy. When the engines caught fire flames spread and the B.36 was doomed. That class of aircraft are the biggest operational planes in the world, designed to carry atom bombs. To the relatives of the men who met death in the Atlantic the free world offers heartfelt sympathy.
