LEW WORSHAM'S THRILLING FINISH TOPS 'WORLD' GOLF

At Chiago's Tam O'Shanter course, the richest tournament in golf — for men, and women. Babe Didrikson Zaharias — recovered from her serious illness — stays right up with the lady pros — carding a third place 304. The sports world's happy to see her back in form!

Pacing the field is Patty Berg — who is sensational as usual. Wasn't that a close one! Finishing with a 74, Patty's four under par 300 beats Louis Suggs for five thousand dollars in top money.

Now, the men's final round. Par-smashing golf has dominated the rich tournament.

At the moment young Al Besselink of Grossinger, New York, one of the early leaders, is assuring himself third place and five thousand dollars.

Next, Chandler Harper, 39-year-old star from Portsmouth, Virginia, On the final hole he plants his ball only 2 feet from the cup. The big gallery concedes him victory... a 25 thousand dollar victory — as he completes a birdie three for a 279 nine under par.

But right behind him is Lew Worsham — needing a birdie to tie Harper — an eagle to win. He's 140 yards from the cup — and uses a sand wedge for the shot. The camera follows the ball. The tension is terrific!

He made it!!!

The difference between 10 and 25 thousand dollars hung on that one shot — the most profitable single shot in golf history!

His wife and all golfdom hail the Oakmont, Pennsylvania pro — Lew Worsham — whose wedge shot at Tam O'Shanter will be talked about for years to come!
