embroidered. His action symbolised that the people welcomed
as a friend "the rare White Heron of a single flight". The
Duke also received a clock. The 10,000 present were

highly amused when five-year-old Esther Fawcett escaped 7 chose t dais.
her grandmother's care, Her Majesty told the child to make herself comfertable, so little Esther had a Royal view.
The Queen told the gathering she was inspired and delighted by the great Maori welcome.

The Maoris then walcomed Her Majesty in song, also telling how the first tribes came to New Zealand in great canoes, 500 years ago.
