... dian neutral custodians give the signal ... the hour of liberation is at hand ...
 ... and down Freedom Road at Panmunjom come former North Korean soldiers, captured by
 the Allies during the war.. Eighth Army Commander General Maxwell D. Taylor --
 and the Far East Commander, General John E. Hull greet the Koreans. You're looking
 at men who rejected communism; resisted all efforts of the Reds to get them to
 return. Upwards of 7 thousand board trains for the trip south via Seoul.

Meanwhile, from another exit point -- the Chinese -- 14 thousand former communist
 troops, carrying pictures of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, whose Nationalist
 island stronghold Formosa will be their destination.

Pictures, too, of Sun Yat-sen, founder of the Chinese Republic.

By truck, also via Seoul, they will proceed to the port of Inchon for embarkation.

Their fate much more secure than the 350 former U.N. troops, including 21 Americans,
 who refused to rejoin democracy's ranks. Dishonorable discharges have been ordered
 for the Americans by the U.S. Defense Department.

But honorable, joyous are these scenes in Seoul. South Koreans give liberty's welcome,
 ... the Chinese who rejected tyranny.

... ater, at the Seoul railroad station, the North Koreans en route to ROK relocation
 centers receive tributes as though they were long lost sons returning to the fold....

Now, to Inchon, where a "freedom fleet" -- American landing ships -- awaits the
 Chinese en route Formosa.

At Formosa, they'll undergo an undetermined period of re-education; will be given a
 choice of entering civilian life, or joining the armies of Chiang Kai-Shek.
