One party pretended to be airmen who'd crash landed on the mountain. Walkie-talkie radio directed the other party, supposed to be rescuers. The stretcher cases on this exercise wanted a good deal of faith, because there wasn't much they could do if the carriers had slipped up. However, faith was justified; all came safely home.
