NEWEST VERSION...THE DELTA-WING

Man is dwarfed alongside the Sealmaster -- world's first multi-jet-attack-seaplane!  
Films released by the Department-~~of~~-Defense show the Navy's big swept-wing job capable of speeds over 600 miles per hour. Forerunner of a new concept in naval warfare, it can make an operational runway of five-sixths of the earth's surface. A T-shaped tail, three stories high, tops the long, sleek and narrow hull.

Newest version of the Air Force supersonic interceptor -- the Delta-Wing F-102 A.

It combines the ultimate in electronics and armament, for seeking out and destroying the enemy at all altitudes, day or night, at high speeds, under all weather conditions -- with minimum reliance on human assistance. These pictures show the unusual design from which the deltas take their name. The wing forms an equilateral triangle, with all sides the same length. Thus it resembles Delta, fourth letter of the old Greek alphabet.
