OVER THE BARRELS

At Grossinger, New York, the fifth annual world'd barrel-jumping championship. The nimble and aerobic skaters who are participating qualify by jumping a minimum of seven barrels. The winning jump, however, is based on the maximum number of barrels. At speeds up to fifty miles-an-hour, a spill often produces a not-too-comfortable finish. To borrow a baseball phrase: three up, three down.

Four-times winner Terry Browne, changes his mind. That's also permissible. The holder of the world's record finishes sixth today.

Winner, with a new record: 15 barrels; 28 feet, seven inches is Lee Label of Lake Placid, in his first such competition.

COURT TRADITION: NOTRE DAME VS. N.Y.U.
