14/75 Outside of GHQ followed by interrogation of first prisoner brought into GHQ from Villa Quesada. Questioning prisoner is Col. Guillermo Salazar, chief of Intelligence Dept. and his assistant Maj. Jorge Pacheco.

75 Shots at airport awaiting arrival of OAS Commission. Typical reservists, one carrying coffee.

0/22 Arrival of OAS Commission.

This roll contains various scenes of machine guns, rifles, ammunition and parachutes, which were shown to the OEA delegation in the Ministry of Foreign Relations. (The parachutes were used to drop in arms and ammunition to the revolutionaries).
