FORMOSA TENSE U.S. 7TH FLEET MAINTAINS VIGIL

Elements of the U.S. Seventh Fleet, in the turbulent strait between Formosa and the Chinese Mainland! Turbulent, too, are news accounts of this hour—Nationalist—held islands off the coast, in constant danger of Red invasion.

Department of Defense films show carriers of Task Force 77 testing wings and firepower. Meanwhile, the current Communist threat against the Tachen Islands, 200 miles north of Formosa, leads to reports that American sea and airpower might, if necessary, help evacuate Chinese Nationalist troops. Should this occur, President Eisenhower would first seek formal Congressional approval.

The fleet remains vigilant, alert!
