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Jamaica was very briefly seen by Princess Margaret on her way to Trinidad. While the aircraft refuelled she drove round Montego Bay, had ten in a cottage and was now back at the airport, enjoying the usual high wind in Jamaica, about to embark on the last leg of the flight, miles
1,000 /to Trinidad. There was an air of informality about this pleasing departure.

Canpopus' next landing was at Pierco Airport, Trinidad.

The welcome was expressed on behalf of the Island by the Governor, Major-General Sir Hubert Pance, whose white tunic (and lady Pance's silk frack) were a sign that in a mere 24 hours Her Royal Highness had exchanged the English winter for the sun-bathed West Indies. Trinidad police formed an impressive guard of honour. The Princess was much admired in her pale beige taffeta dress.

After the inspection Her Royal Highness said goodbye to
the crew of the Airliner Canopus before replying to the
Governor's address of welcome and expressing her delight
at being in the West Indies and having the opportunity
of meeting their people. By this time, into Trinidad
waters, had sailed the Royal Yacht Britannia, in which
Princess Margaret will journey among the Caribbean Islands.
The Village of Arima's 10,000 people were the next inhabitants
of Trinidad to cheer the Royal visitor. It was already
evident that in the next four weeks Her Majesty's charming
sister will be a guest most royally received.
