ARMY UNVEILS LATEST  
ADVANCE IN FIELD  
OF AVIATION

(Official Army Footage Released by Dept. of Defense)

FORT WORTH, TEXAS... Bell Aircraft Corporation unveiled today its new XV-3 convertiplane developed for the Army under a joint Army-Air Force contract. Combining the preferred features of the helicopter and the airplane, the tilting-rotor type convertiplane is expected to provide the Army with heretofore unknown flexibility and mobility for entire combat units. Helicopter features enable it to operate out of rough, confined areas and once in the air, fly as an airplane with a speed of over 175 miles per hour.

Three-bladed combination rotor-propellers mounted near the tips of a stubby fixed wing, operate as conventional lifting rotors during take-offs, landing and low speed flight. For cruise and high speed flight, they act as airplane propellers. The conversion can be safely completed in 10 to 15 seconds. Like a helicopter, the convertiplane is capable of hovering, or moving forward, backward and sideward with equal ease, making maneuvering and landings in confined areas possible even under gusty wind conditions.

Military spokesmen said the primary purpose of the convertiplane program is to explore the tilting-rotor design for tactical use as an Army observation-reconnaissance, evacuation and liaison aircraft, Air Force rescue missions, and for potential future development of larger cargo-assault transport versions.

developed in a day-long in Federal Court when Matusow repeated a portion that he had lied as a government witness in the thirteen convicted Communist leaders.

As a result of Matusow's revelations, he is appearing now as one of the thirteen, who are facing a new trial.

Defended by Harry Sachser, of New York, Matusow said he had given false testimony in the 1952 trial against the defendant.

Pettis Perry, Alexander Sternberg, Arnold Johnson, Gannett and George Blake were also named.

In a "soul-cleansing" letter to Joseph R. McCarthy on Aug. 23, 1953, and introduced into evidence, Matusow said:

"I testified at the trial of the thirteen Communist leaders that the defense lawyer said I did anything for a buck. I lied it then but he was right. The only thing honest then was my testimony.

Next month I will be 28 — eight years of being a Communist and being dishonest. Or I say most of the time. I have gone through life hurting people I love and believe in. I am dishonest with them. I am afraid that if I were honest I would be hurt by them."

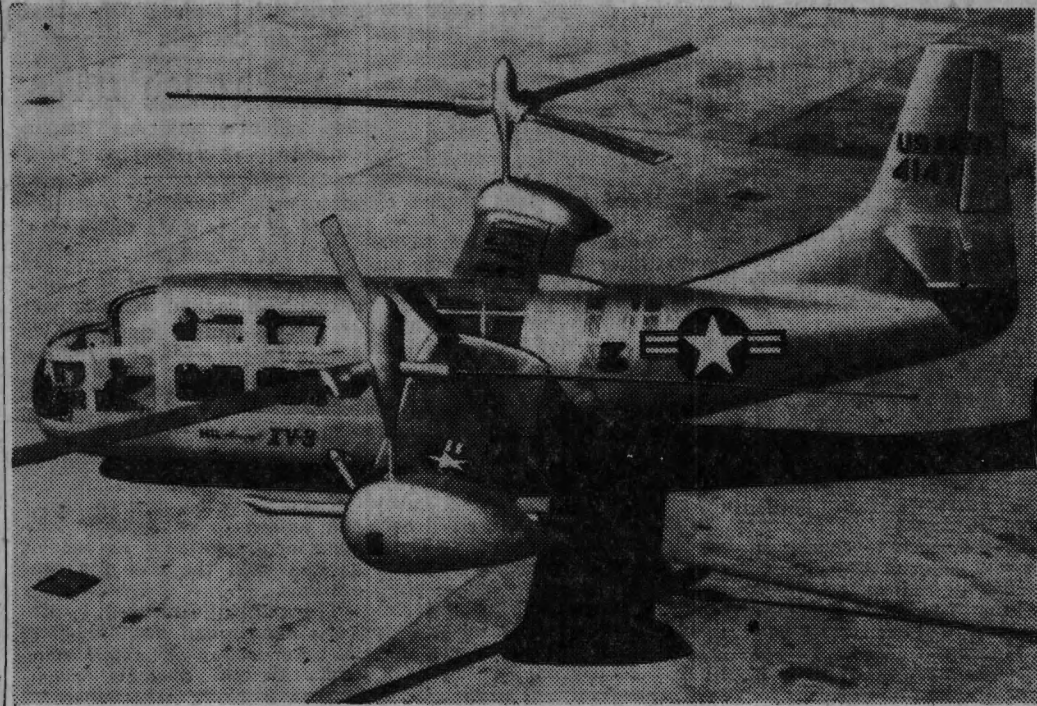

# Convertiplane Rises Vertically and Flies at 175 M. P. H.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Feb. 10 (AP)—A strange-looking airplane with movable helicopter blades mounted on its wingtips was unveiled today.

It was hailed by Frank H. Higgins, assistant Secretary of the Army, as a possible answer to problems of military logistics.

The new aircraft, the XV-3 convertiplane, takes off and lands vertically like a helicopter and then rotates its blades to serve as propellers in forward flight.

It made its debut at the Bell Aircraft Corporation's Hurst plant near here.

More than 200 Army and Air Force officers, civic leaders and newsmen along with 2,000 Bell employees saw the new craft at the closed showing. The plane

was developed by Bell under a joint Army-Air Force contract.

"We hope the convertiplane is going to fulfill our needs to get our soldiers out of the slush, mud and ice and enable them to get there fastest with the most ease without being tied down to an airstrip," Mr. Higgins said in a speech.

Military planners are thinking more and more in terms of airborne travel and equipment to solve logistic problems, he said.

Three-bladed combination rotor-propellers are mounted near the tips of the short, slender fixed wings. During take-offs, landings and low-speed flight they act as lifting rotors. They can be rotated 90 degrees to serve as airplane

propellers for cruising and high speed flight.

As an airplane, the convertiplane is of medium-range with a speed of more than 175 miles an hour.

The convertiplane unveiled here is thirty feet long. It is thirteen feet high. Its wingspread is thirty feet. Power is supplied by a single engine mounted behind the passenger-pilot cabin.

The plane shown today by Bell is somewhat similar to the one described at New Castle, Del., two weeks ago. The latter craft, developed by the Transcendental Aircraft Corporation with Air Force support, uses wing-tip rotors that tilt 82 degrees to a forward position for regular flight after the plane has taken off like a helicopter.
