This is the House of Representatives in Lagos,
Nigeria, where the first session of Parliament
under the revised Constitution was opened
recently. The changes carry the Regions of
Nigeria a considerable way towards internal
self-government.

Here is a detachment of troops marching towards the House as the members begin to arrive, accompanied by their friends and families.

This is the Sardauna of Sokoto, Premier of the Northern Region.

The members, representing different regions of Nigeria and the Cameroons, came in European or more colourful dress.

These wear their own distinctive robes.

Sir John MacPherson, the Governor-General,
arrives to open the House.

Here you see the Governor-General taking the

salute and, before the proceedings begin,
he inspects the Guard of Honour, mounted by
a detachment of the Nigeria Regiment with
considerable smartness and efficiency.

All the members are now in the House, and
they stand as the Governor-General makes his
way towards the throne. From it he will
deliver his address and announce a message
from the Queen and another from the Colonial
Secretary, who had hoped to be present.
Sir John takes his place and then rises and
bows gravely, before delivering the Queen's
message and paying tribute to the constructive work of the former House of

Representatives.
