Margaret landed at St. George's, Grenada, where she stayed for two days. H.R.H. was welcomed by the Governor of the Windward Islands, Sir Edward Beetham and his wife.

Grenada was discovered by Columbus and was first colonized by the French. It has been under British rule nearly two hundred years. Arriving on Sunday the Princess attended divine service at St. George's Anglican Church.

After the service Princess Margaret drove to lunch at Government House and a garden party afterwards. As throughout the tour a full programme was arranged. In fact almost the only rest the Princess is having is aboard the royal yacht, on which she journeys between the Caribean Islands.

In Barbados the Princess visited a health centre at
