need for secrecy was paramount.

ST. HELENA RECALLED

Mahe, where Archbishop Makarios will be detained, is the chief of the 92 islands of the Seychelles group, and lies in the Indian Ocean, 600 miles north of Madagascar. It is assumed that he will share his exile with the Bishop of Kyrenia and the two other priests who were deported with him.

with him.

The country bungalow of the Governor of the Colony (Sir William Addis) at San Souci hill station, which is being prepared for the Archbishop, is described as being reminiscent of Longwood, in St. Helena, where Napoleon fixed in exile. It stands 1,000 feet above the sea and overlooks the barbour of Victoria, the capital of the islands. There is a big garden, and the nearest house is half a mile away. The climate is cool and equable. It is stated that the Archbishop will have attendants and allowances in accordance with his "rank and station."

Escape from any of the Seychelles, to which the British Government sent internees during the war, is regarded as impossible.

during the war, is regarded as impossible. There are no airfields in the islands, and no telephone service to the east African main-land, 1,000 miles away. Four shipping lines call at Victoria once a month.
