FIRST PICTURES REVOLT CRUSHED IN ARGENTINA

From Argentina, first films to reach the United States of an unsuccessful counter-revolution. Government planes bomb rebel strongholds -- barracks in La Plata, 35 miles from Buenos Aires, and Santa Rosa, 3 hundred and 75 miles from the capital. It was in these cities that the armed followers of the ousted dictator Juan Peron revolted. The government troops flush out rebels as a state of martial law is declared. This makes prisoners liable to death by firing squad. Thirty-eight are reported shot, while the fate of 300 is to be decided by military tribunals. The revolt lasts 14 hours. In Buenos Aires, cheers for Admiral Isaac Rojas, the Vice President. In the absence of President Aramburu, he commanded the victorious government troops. From Government House, Admiral Rojas announces victory and praises the "indestructible union of the armed forces." With the lifting of martial law, the government returns to the task of building toward a more stable, political future.
