Description of cut subject : "SOVIET AIR DISPLAY"

Roll 1. Shots of the vast crowd walking to Tushind Airfield on the outskirts of Moscow.

Distant shots of anti-aircraft guns firing the role to announce the opening of the show.

1. Fly-past of aircraft carrying banners reading "Glory to the Soviet People".

2. Formation of Yak 17 fighters spelling out "Glory to the Communist Party".

Crowd shots and close-ups.

Roll 2. (N.B. missed bombers fly-past owing to camera jam).

Various unidentified fighters of new design

Mass parachute descent.

Massed helicopters (probably M.I-1 single rotor) and double rotors, land men and equipment.)

AIR DISPLAY IN MOSCOW

On the 24th of June the traditional Air Display for the USSR Air Force Day was held at the Tushino Airfield.

By 10 A.M. the huge territory of the Airfield was filled with hundreds of thousands of spectators.

On the terrace of the Central Chkalov Air Club are -- leaders of the Communist Party and the Soviet Government, Marshals of the Soviet Union, air Marshals...

Among them we see Kliment Voroshilov, Nikolai Bulganin, Nikita Khrushchev and Georgy Zhukov.

The Air Display is attended by His Royal Highness Emir Mohammed el Badr, Crown Prince, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Yemen, numerous foreign guests among whom there are air-force delegations from Great Britain, Chinese People's Republic, United States of America, France, the Republic of India and other countries.

The British delegation is led by Mr. N. Berch, Minister for Aviation. Heads of Embassies and Legations in Moscow, military and naval attaches are also present.

The Display was opened by a group of sport aircraft, carrying the flags of the Soviet Union and its sixteen republics; they flew at an altitude of 100 metres.

The Air Display has shown new Soviet aircraft engineering.

The spectators see heavy jet bombers fly past; various types of fighters, as well as passenger jet aircraft.

Soviet pilots have demonstrated their skill in aerobatics on various types of jet fighters.

Over the airfield an armade of helicopters made its appearance among which there are the so called "flying wagons" - record

weightlifters.

The Soviet parachute jumpers have shown their skill also at the Air Display.
