REPLY OF HIS MAJESTY THE KING OF IRAQ

TO THE

ADDRESS OF WELCOME AT GUILDHALL

My Lord Mayor,

Aldermen and Commons of the City of London.

I regard it as an honour paid to my country that you should receive me at Guildhall. These ancient walls remind us of your glorious history, and your long tradition of civil liberties, of which you should be justly proud.

London is the city of merchants and bankers, who have for centuries enjoyed an unequalled reputation for integrity and enterprise. I am particularly pleased to take this opportunity to acknowledge on behalf of my Government and my people the important part which the City of London is playing in the ever expanding economy of my country.

Iraq is today a large buyer in our part of the world of British manufactures. But as our development programme is gradually implemented there will be an ever increasing demand on our part for your manufactures, and for the skill of your people. I assure you that we look forward to such a prospect of even closer collaboration between us in the economic as well as the political field in these promising days in my country's history.

We, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of London in Common Council assembled, take the greatest pleasure in offering to you in the name of the Corporation, and on behalf of the Citizens of London, the warmest possible welcome on the occasion of Your Majesty's visit to this country in all the splendour of your Sovereignty.

We are happy to think that some of four Majesty's earlier days, before the cares of State cast their full burden of responsibility upon you, were spent in our midst, and we trust that your recollections of that period of your life are as joyous to you as they are happy and memorable to us.

Your Majesty's presence in our ancient and historic Guildhall today, accompanied by His Royal Highness the Emir Abdul Illah, is a high honour which we acknowledge with deep appreciation.

It affords us the opportunity of recording, with feelings of the utmost satisfaction, the cordial relations which prevail between our two countries.

We fervently hope that peace and prosperity may strengthen the bonds of friendship which our peoples have in common, so that, in mutual respect and understanding of each other's needs, our Nations may fulfil their great destinies to their own advantage, and in contribution to the peace of the whole world.

That Iraq may continue to flourish under the wise guidance and leadership of Your Majesty, is the heartfelt prayer of every one of us.

We trust that your visit to Great Britain may afford you much interest and pleasure, and we extend to Your Majesty the sincere wish that in health and strength your reign may be long and happy, and that your labours may be blessed with all the rewards of progress and endeavour, bringing to you and your people, the lasting contentment of noble achievement.
