## ACTION ON SUEZ

Mechanised Engenhaliman Guards at Windsor were set for orders to proceed overseas; part of the military operations touched off by Nasser's seizure of the Suez Canal; measures Great Britain is taking to ensure that Egypt does not close the waterway. International rights there cannot be left unprotected. Across at Brent Wook, Essex, the 1st Bettalion Oxford and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry were issued with tropical kit at Warley Barracks.

The 3rd Infantry Division of the strategic Reserve was under orders for Middle East service.

The French National Assembly, in extra session, heard

Foreign Minister Pineau's report on Suez events. Not only
is France, like Britain, a big canal shareholder, she is
anxious about her army in Algeria, should the canal be
closed. Premier Mollet informed deputies that three-quarters
of the French Navy was in the Mediterranean and that in
Toulon orders had been received to be instantly ready to
sail. In these waters the French have men-o'-war of
tennage totalling 200,000. The most important vessels
there are the aircraft carrier Arromanches and the 35,000U.S.
ton Jean Bart. As the amandment 6th Fleet has put to sea

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The Royal Navy swung into action. The aircraft carrier
Theseus sailed to the Mediterranean from Portsmouth, her
deck laden with transport of the 16th Independent Parachute
Brigade Group. The flight deck, 230 yards long, provided
fine parking space for rows of three-ton lorries. and other
military vehicles. Then came the men. Farewells were
not tearful. It was felt that what was now under way was
an operation of military policing. Given enough men on
point duty there are no delinquents, senior or junior.
