DECLARATION DE MONSIEUR PINEAU SUR SUEZ

La session parlementaire Ordinaire 1955-1956 a pris fin, mais avant de se séparer, l'Assemblée Nationale a tenu une séance particulièrement importante en raison des événements de Suez.

MM. Christian Pineau et Guy Mollet ont réaffirmé à cette occasion la solidarité de la France avec la Grande Bretagne et les Etats Unis à ce sujet

MR. DULLES' SPEECH

It is inadmissible that a waterway, internationalised by Treaty, which is required for the livelihood of a score or more of nations should be exploited by one country for purely selfish purposes.

To permit this to go unchallenged would be to encourage the breakdown of the international fabric upon which the security and well being of all peoples depend.

We believe that out of this conference will come a plan for the international operation of the canal which will give assurance that the objectives of the 1880 Treaty will in fact, be realised, and that the canal will continue to be operated by those who feel that ^{it is} their duty to serve the international community and not to serve the special interests of any one nation.

We assume, Mr. President, that the conference will not fail but will succeed, and I believe that by the conference we will invoke moral forces which are bound to prevail. Mr. President, you and I have often talked about our Declaration of Independence and the principles which are set forth in that great document and one of those principles is that which our founders pledged themselves that they would pay a decent respect for the opinions of mankind. I believe, Mr. President, that most people pay decent respect for the opinions of mankind when they are soberly, carefully and deliberately formulated. And because I believe that I am confident that out of this conference will come a judgement of such moral force that we can be confident that the Suez Canal will go on as it has for the last 100 years for the years in the future to serve in peace the interests of mankind.
