75th BIRTHDAY SALUTE . . . HOLLYWOOD'S MOST CELEBRATED CITIZEN CECIL B. DE MILLE At his Hollywood home, Cecil B. De Mille finds himself before the lenses of a motion picture camera — not as a director or producer, but as a news subject. 75 years young, he takes the three-quarter century milestone in his stride, working 12 to 16 hours a day on his latest production ... his 70th since 1913, when he pioneered production in Hollywood. Playwright and actor, a descendent of one of America's oldest families, he turned his talents to the creation of a new art form. A man who had rarely seen a camera, he made "The Squaw Man", the first <u>full-length</u> <u>American</u> feature picture. A rented barn was the studio ... <u>but Hollywood had been</u> born!

The years saw him emerge as the king of motion picture spectacles. His biblical epics, such as this first production of "The Ten Commandments" in 1923 winning him a place of esteem in film annals, even before they emerged from silent screen to talkies.

With his wife, whom he wed in 1902, at his side, he reaped the rewards of his pioneer efforts. Producer, director, star maker, innovator, technician -- the titles all fell gracefully upon his shoulders.

The coveted Oscar of the Motion Picture Academy of Arts and Sciences has twice been awarded to him. Here, Mary Pickford presents him the Academy Award for his film "The Greatest Show on Earth". It is estimated his motion pictures have been seen by audiences totalling more than one-and-one-half times the present population of the earth;

And he's still going strong! At 75, having completed in Hollywood, and on location in Egypt, in the original biblical locales, <u>The Ten Commandments</u>. His first production of the epic story in 1923 was a biblical prologue to a modern story.
